HOW WE OBSERVE LENT



This year, Ash Wednesday falls early, on February 18, to begin our annual observance of the season of Lent. On that Wednesday, we begin Lent with an ancient tradition, our Agape Supper. This time of preparation begins at 6:00pm with a sacrificial meal of soup, bread, cheese, and fruit. We then continue in an attitude of worship in preparation for partaking of communion. There will be childcare provided after the meal. Tickets are \$3.50 for adults and \$1.00 for children and can be bought on Sunday, Feb. 8, or Sunday, Feb. 15. We will continue our Lenten season with a six-week, church-wide study on doing life missionally (see page 6). Holy Week services will include Palm Sunday on March 29, Maundy Thursday on April 2, and culminate on Easter, April 5.

PASTORS' PAGE

— JAN AND TIM DEVINE, CO-PASTORS

2015 has arrived. People have transitioned back to their regular routines. The much-anticipated holiday season passed in a blink. Parties, decorations, and gift giving may have created a brief distraction; for a moment we may have been able to set aside the things that weigh heavily upon us . . . but we are back in the real world with its real struggles. We are back in the midst of the unrest that is not just found in far-away places across the globe, but right here in our country, our community, our church, and our own lives as well.

“He grants peace to your borders.” Psalm 147:14

Psalm 147 was likely written after the Jews returned from exile in Babylon. No matter what they had been through, the psalmist's words were intended to remind them that in the same way our sovereign God sustains the cosmos he created, so too he would sustain and care for them.

But what did that mean? Would Jerusalem be a wonderland of genuine community and cooperation among its citizens? Would all conflict, discord, and unrest cease?

Not likely. It's not in keeping with what we know from Scriptures about the post-exilic period in Judah. The problems they faced were no different than those common to all of humanity. Tight-lipped peace was possible not because threats were eliminated, but because they were dealt with by the powerful Persian government that dominated them.

As we think about peace in a personal sense, what does it mean to have peace within the borders of our lives? Anyone who has been around the block a few times knows that problems and threats to our inner peace will keep coming as long as we are on this side of eternity. Peace in this life will not be the eradication of unrest or the elimination of struggles. Turmoil and trouble will continue to show up in old and new ways.

The Hebrew word for peace— *shalom* — does not mean the absence of conflict. It means wholeness in the fullest sense, including spiritual. Paul promised this kind of peace to the Philippians at a time when they were facing turmoil from both within and beyond their borders. He urged them to practice the right attitudes and disciplines that would usher in God's gift of peace that transcends human understanding.

Rejoice in the Lord always, I will say it again: Rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.
(Phil. 4:4-7)

May God grant us the gift of peace in our relationship with God and with each other in this new year.

CONNECTING THOUGHTS

Eleven years ago we had our first church-wide Lenten study with Rick Warren's *Purpose Driven Life*. Many of us remember the opening sentence, "It's not about you." This is a sobering thought considering American society says, "it IS all about me and my desires/wants, no matter what it means to others." As people seek to understand what their purpose is here on earth, are we willing to search for God's purpose for us even if it does not match up with what we believe our life should look like? While we were visiting family over Christmas, the church we attended said that, "It is in corporate worship that we find our identity." Part of that corporate worship is being in community and struggling together with what God's Scripture means for life and purpose here on earth. Another thought from a book I read recently is, "You were created by a community to exist in community, made in the image of a God who has never known anything except community" (*Crossroads* by Wm. Paul Young). Since FPC does believe we are to be in community together and corporate worship is integral to this, each Lent we choose a study that we do together church-wide through both our worship services and our small groups.

This year, the study we have chosen is *Life on Mission: God's People Finding God's Heart for the World* by Tim Harlow; this study is a call to action for everyone who identifies as a Christ-follower. His common sense, "one step at a time," approach to living out what Jesus describes as our purpose is refreshing and easy for everyone to comprehend. You don't have to be a biblical scholar to live life on mission – you just have to love God, love people, and live that way.



The reality is that God calls some people to travel across the globe to be His hands and feet to the people living in far-off lands. But He calls **all** people to love those in our "Jerusalem" (Acts 1:8)- those people who live down the hall, down the block, and around the corner. We are **all** called to be salt and light to our families, friends, neighbors, co-workers, and to everyone else He puts in our paths.

The sessions in this study provide us with do-able steps and strategies to CONNECT, SERVE, SHARE, GROW, and PRAY.

Imagine what our communities would be like, and how many of God's prodigals and lost sheep would come home, if we all committed to living this way!

As we approach the Lenten season (Ash Wednesday is February 18), there will be opportunities to join others in small groups to wrestle together with what it means for our lives if we truly lived as though we are on a mission from God!

SESSION UPDATE

-JANET FREDERICK, CLERK OF SESSION

It is not only the Session and our congregation engaged in the discernment process. The Presbytery is also doing its part, and on December 3 and January 14, members of the Presbytery Discernment Team met with Session members to further define our relationship, establish some goals and make plans for the future. We are pleased with this relationship so far and believe that all involved are truly committed to trying to determine what God has planned for this congregation and have pledged to do it in a loving, gracious way.

As part of our continuing education during the discernment process, Elders spent time previewing part of the presentation that was presented on the authority of Scripture on December 11. Hermeneutics is defined as a study of the principles of biblical interpretation, and Ed Fiaschi and Jan Devine led the information session for congregation members.

The co-pastors announced that four people would be joining the church as the result of the New Member Class this fall. Elders then met with Jamie and Nathan Jacobs, Jane Kamper, and Josh Luce prior to their being received on December 21. Other important dates were set for the examination of incoming officers (January 14), Ordination/Installation (January 18), and the Annual Meeting (January 25), which will be preceded by a joint worship service at 10:00am.

The Clerk presented a motion to have W. David and Mary Jenkins and Barbara and Karel Simeon removed from the active membership list per their request.

Chair of the House Committee, Dave Youngs, said that the stained glass windows on the north side of the sanctuary would be removed in December and taken to be repaired and returned in the spring. The windows have since been removed. Congregation members are invited to make donations to help cover the cost of these repairs and those to other windows.

As we heard from ministry team leaders and liaisons with staff, we learned about the recent activities of the Christian Education Ministry Team, Mission and Stewardship Committee, Small Group Ministry and the Worship Team Ministry Team. From Treasurer Art Davis, we had our first look at the outside financial review that was recently done, learned about the redistribution of flood relief money and then discussed the establishment of a Special Gift Fund.

AN INVITATION TO PRAY AND FAST

Session members have committed to a 24-hour period of prayer and fasting prior to each monthly Session meeting during the discernment process. We invite all of you to also engage in an intentional time of prayer, Bible study and fasting – this month from Tuesday, January 13, after dinner to Wednesday, January 14, at dinnertime.

DISCERNMENT UPDATE

Discernment is an ongoing activity, and the Elders have been actively engaged in intentional periods of prayer and fasting and training sessions on some of the key topics you have defined.

You are all encouraged to continue discerning with us. There are information sessions planned, written resources available, and Elders willing to speak at small group gatherings (your formal small groups or informal groups) or even to meet with you individually. Please remember we are all in this for the same reason: to seek God's will for First Pres. and to reach more people and together grow in Christ.

We have also heard from some of you that you would like an opportunity to sit and discuss the issues involved in our discernment in an informal setting – no presentation – just an opportunity to talk with others from various perspectives and connect people in both services to share your questions, convictions, and hopes. We will provide an opportunity to do this on Sunday, January 18, in the Chapel between the two worship services. Although Elders will be present to listen, they will not be leading what we hope will become a monthly opportunity for open discussion.
