
## SMALL GROUP TESTIMONY -ANONYMOUS

## **CONNECTING THOUGHTS FOR DECEMBER** — SHARON EARLY

As part of our small group ministry, I continually try to understand where small groups fit in the big picture of our local church. Many of us may be aware of FPC's Mission and Purpose Statements but are we equally aware of our Vision Statement (What God wants to do)?

We believe God wants to transform our community through the saving love of Jesus Christ and calls us to share that hope with the world. To be an agent of hope, our congregation must work together and rely on the power of the Holy Spirit to follow Christ, whatever the cost. This commitment, which is grounded in a deep love of God and neighbor, sends us out to share the Good News of Christ through our words and our actions.

So how do small groups help us live into our Vision Statement? Are we transforming our community? Are we relying on the power of the Holy Spirit no matter the cost? Are we sharing the Good News of Christ? I recently read an article "*Where Are the Mature Believers? The disconnect between small groups and discipleship*" by Rick Howerton that had me questioning some of the above. One quote that particularly impacted me was "*Why are my Christian brothers and sisters around the world willing to die for Christ when the people I lead aren't even willing to live for him?*" Are we, the members of the FPC community, willing to live for Christ? Are our small groups pushing each of its members to become fully devoted followers of Christ? Do our lives look any different than those in the secular world?

These are the questions that continue to propel us forward in training events, church-wide studies and continue to look at how to form new groups so that I hope our church would create the following type of mature disciples Howerton references:

"Ones that not only evangelize, but also stand for Christ in the midst of emotional and physical persecution, live lives that depict the love of Christ, and lead people to believe that Jesus is real and truly capable of transforming lives. They serve in ways that take the burden off the church staff, and they support the mission of the church. They live in peace and unity with other believers, making the church a magnet for those longing for a loving, caring community."

So the question is, how does your life reflect the above statement of a mature disciple? If you are struggling as many of us are to transform our lives to be devoted followers of Christ, then are you investing of yourself in a small group?

During the Christmas season, many of our groups may not Page 7 meet regularly; however, many do choose to share our hope of Christ with our community by adopting families, participating in church-wide events (*Loving Hands* or the Deacon's Angel Tree) along with many other ways they choose to spread God's love to a hurting world at a time of the year many feel disconnected from.

Once January arrives, groups will become more active with new studies, training for our leaders at the conference day on January 17 and looking ahead to our Lenten study. So my call out from this article is on many levels:

**Those not members of groups** — let me know you are interested. Some groups have space for new members or we work on starting new groups.

**Existing small group members** — how is your group doing on discipling mature believers? Every member of the group is responsible for helping their group live into the vision of the church and growing in their faith. Are you actively participating?

**New leaders** — For those feeling the tug to help grow the small group ministry and be open to starting a new group, you won't want to miss the conference day on January 17!

So now that I have mentioned it several times, *what is our Conference Day?!* It is a training day provided for leadership from the Small Group Ministry and Children's Ministry areas of FPC. The theme this year is:



The last few years we have been able to provide outside speakers and once again this year, we are excited to be bringing in Chad Miller along with a couple of his associates from the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association, plus we will be Skyping with Beth Guckenberger.

**Chad Miller** was ordained in 2000 as a non-denominational pastor and is currently serving as director of *Dare to Be a Daniel*, a BGEA youth evangelism training project, and as an associate pastor for West Cabarrus Church in Concord, N.C.

**Beth Guckenberger** is co-executive director along with her husband, Todd, of Back2Back Ministries which ministers to orphans and vulnerable children in Mexico, Nigeria, India and Haiti. Many from our congregation were impacted by her testimony two years ago and we are excited to hear from her again!

We will also be introducing our Lenten study to the leaders that day so mark your calendars and plan to join us for a great day of training and inspiration!

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#### SESSION UPDATE -JANET FREDERICK, CLERK OF SESSION

On November 5 Session met with the Deacons (in our annual joint meeting) and also church staff members as we continued our discerning process and education via a Skype presentation by Jeff Wildrick, Executive Presbyter of the Northeast Presbytery of ECO: A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians (see the Discernment Process Update in this newsletter for more details).

Following his presentation, Elders moved into their business meeting and heard from Emrys Tyler, a Susquehanna Valley Presbytery representative, and saw the draft of the policy being proposed for those seeking dismissal from this presbytery. All agreed that we would like a Discernment Team appointed by the Presbytery to work with us through the Discernment Period, thus continuing what has been a spirit of cooperation between First Pres. and the Presbytery in this process.

Then it was on to business as usual, and from the Clerk we learned of 3 people who have asked to be removed from the Active Membership Roll: Tom Decker, who has returned to Union Presbyterian Church; Eileen Slofkosky, who has joined a church closer to her home because of issues she has with driving any distance; and Maynard Koplin, who has joined a Lutheran Church near where he moved to in PA this past summer.

Discussion then moved on to whether the plans should proceed for a trip to Kenya in 2015. Although it was decided that the trip itself should be postponed, ways to support the mission in Kenya were proposed:

- 1) Money from the 2013 Christmas Eve offering will be used to install water purification systems for two orphanages in Kenya and to train two people through WaterStep.
- 2) \$7,000 will hopefully be raised to fund building the church that our mission team would have finished if they had gone, with those funds coming from the proceeds of: the Mystery Dinner Theater; the 2014 Christmas Eve offering; and other donations. Session supported the co-pastors' desire to seek alternative ways to serve in international missions in 2015.

Mission and Stewardship brought their recommendation to Session for the use of undesignated local, national and international mission funds that need to be used before the end of the year. We also approved a request from Brian and Angela Flannagan to lead a mission trip to the Dominican Republic for college-age students and young adults and their families in early 2015.

# AN INVITATION TO PRAY AND FAST

Session members have committed to a 24-hour period of prayer and fasting prior to each monthly Session meeting during the discernment process. We invite all of you to also engage in an intentional time of prayer, Bible study and fasting – this month from Tuesday, December 2, after dinner to Wednesday, December 3, at dinnertime.

## DISCERNMENT UPDATE -JANET FREDERICK, CLERK OF SESSION

We are well into our discernment process, and we hope that you are finding the resources we've been providing helpful. Some of you have invited us to speak at your small group gatherings, and others have asked to speak to us individually. We have a schedule of educational/informational sessions scheduled for the next few months and hope you will take advantage of each of them since each is on a different topic.

On November 5 Session members, Deacons and Staff members were invited to a presentation by Jeff Wildrick, Executive Presbyter of the Northeast Presbytery of ECO: A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians. We were able to hear (and see) him via Skype, which was the next best thing to being able to speak with him personally. Then on Sunday, November 16, following each of the worship services, the congregation was invited to see and hear a video recording of major portions of his talk, review a comparison of several different Presbyterian denominations, and were then given the opportunity to ask questions of Session members.

# WHAT ARE WE WAITING FOR? -THE WORSHIP MINISTRY TEAM

Christmas in America kicks off around Halloween and concludes at midnight on December 25. On December 26, people start packing Christmas away. It's over.

But for the Christian Church, Christmas doesn't truly begin until December 25. It's actually a season in the church year, and it ends 12 days later on January 5 (Twelfth Night). While the rest of the world is doing Christmas, Christians are in the season of Advent- a time of waiting and preparation.

One of the activities we do during Advent is light the Advent Wreath. We do this at the beginning of our worship services, but families can also do this at home during family worship. There are 5 candles in the wreath, and we light one on each of the 4 Sundays prior to Christmas. There are many resources available for this act of worship. The resource we will be using this year uses the candles to represent hope- for those who *wait*, for those who are *weary*, for those who are *watching*, and for those who are *wounded*. The 5<sup>th</sup> candle, a white one, is the Christ candle, and it is lit on Christmas Eve. The candles serve as a reminder that Jesus is the light of our world: his light shines in our darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it. (John 1:4-5)



Purple is the color of Advent, for the royalty of the King of Kings, whose birth we are celebrating and whose second coming we are awaiting. We use 3 purple candles and 1 rose-colored candle (which represents joy) in our Advent wreath.

It is no accident that we celebrate the birth of Christ in the darkest days of December. The shortest day of the year (or the longest hours of darkness) falls on December 21, the winter solstice. Pagans celebrated this time rejoicing that the light would be steadily returning until the longest day of the year--June 21, the summer equinox. Our early Christian forbearers understood this yearning for the light and realized the true light our hearts were yearning for is Jesus.

Early Christmas trees were evergreens decorated only with candles, a testimony to the "ever green" or eternal life and the unchanging love of God and his Son, who is the light of the world who drives out the darkness. We place "Christmons" (Christ monograms) on our tree in the sanctuary, which are symbols that direct our thoughts toward Jesus. The white is for purity and the gold is for the majesty of God. The white lights remind us that Jesus is the one true light who banishes the darkness and leads us to a life of hope and joy.

While the rest of the world is singing Christmas songs, we begin with songs of Advent- songs of longing and preparation for the arrival of the Holy One, the Son of God. Joyous when he appears, we celebrate for 12 days, singing songs about Christ's first and second coming, as we marvel at God's greatest gift of all, the gift of his Son, Jesus the Christ. Hallelujah, Christ is born!
