

Traditionally, Thanksgiving is seen as a time of feasting for the Pilgrims and Native Americans as they came together. The reality is that after losing over half of their population in the first year of life in the New World, the Pilgrims gathered together to give thanks to God for his provision in difficult times. FAITH VERSUS FRUGALITY - JAN AND TIM DEVINE, CO-PASTORS

Dear Friends,

FPC Elders spent a lot of time talking, working and praying this month in order to develop the 2014 proposed budget. If you had been at the two October Session meetings, you would have listened to a group of people wrestling to be faithful stewards of both the money you give and the mission God calls us to. It is not easy to balance these two things.

There are people who naturally tend to be "balanced budget" people. They believe a balanced budget has integrity; but it is also a theological issue to be good stewards of all that God has graciously given us.

Others tend to be "faith budget" people. For them, it is a theological issue to not short-change God and his mission by our human fears and limitations.

Whatever our natural human tendencies, the elders together recognize that it is best to live by faith <u>and</u> Frugality, to focus on good stewardship <u>and</u> truly believe that God is more than able to accomplish what concerns us in every area of life... including the church budget.

Here are some of the factors that make setting the budget a logistical and spiritual challenge :

- In addition to the economic realities all around us, there have been some very gracious gifts that we cannot count on in the future, either because of death or because these gifts are running out.
- It would not be good stewardship to simply cut budgets across the board without discerning. What is most fruitful/necessary in order to further the Kingdom of God? Are there things that we might cut that will ultimately cost us more than the money we save? Can ministries combine efforts more to do things better?
- There have been questions about which groups of people give the most financial support to the church. Knowing what portion of our support comes from different age groups in the church is important information in terms of how we disciple and encourage people and how we plan for the future, but not to use as leverage for one service over another or one program/ministry over another. The session and finance committee will be looking at our giving patterns in the coming months in order to help us discern how these patterns will affect the future.
- As we look at finances, what are the root problems that cannot be fixed by cutting dollars from the budget:
 - Is the level of giving a spiritual issue in our congregation?
 - Is the congregation uninformed?
 - Are we focusing on the right things?
 - Do we have more staff than we can afford for our size and level of activity?
 - Has prayer truly been an integral part of our process as individuals, as elders, as staff, or do we lean more on human wisdom and solutions?
 - Is it all of the above?
- How do we address these problems so that we are not in the same place—spiritually or financially- in 2015, '16 and '17?

As one elder said, "I am always concerned that there is a danger of cutting programs vital to our ministry. Cutting items is only a first step to balancing a budget. We must prayerfully consider what God is calling us to do, and then act on the belief that the means will be provided. In particular, we should find ways in which to enhance our Stewardship Ministry. The church budget is a statement of faith... faith that God is calling us to this work, and faith that the means will be provided. Our faith is strengthened through struggle. When we struggle, we learn to rely on God's faithfulness."

CONNECTING MINISTRIES - SHARON EARLY

As FPC has been preparing its budget for next year, it became clear to me that in order to determine where (and if) I could cut my budget, I needed to evaluate how we have been doing with our small group ministry goals. The box to the right gives three main goals of the ministry and highlighted to me that we need to once again refocus our direction in the area of small groups.

Each goal has suffered over the past couple of years; not because we haven't had dedicated leaders (because we do!) but because we don't always step back to evaluate what is happening within a ministry. The budget process can be frustrating at times, but it does force us to evaluate whether we are being good stewards of God's money and expanding His Kingdom here on earth.

SO WHAT'S NEXT IN THE AREA OF CONNECTING MINISTRIES?!

Bathing the ministry in prayer! If you are willing to be part of this prayer ministry, please let me know. In the past I have sent out prayer reminders to these prayer warriors to keep our small group leaders in prayer; for the decisions for our church-wide studies; and to be praying for new leaders/groups to be listening for God's calling to new connecting points in their lives.

Continue to provide entry points into small groups. I have had the desire to increase this beyond Lent for a number of years now and yet it still has not become a reality. We also desire to have all members be praying for who God is calling them to disciple! Small Groups are only a starting point for nurturing disciples of Christ—it is the one-on-one of each of us mentoring others that effectively forms disciples.

Search out new DVD-based curriculum for groups. This has been one of our most effective ways to help people test the waters of leading a group. We have had some excellent church-wide studies, but it is especially helpful for new leaders to have the resource of supporting DVD's.

Reinvest in our leaders. We have been regularly having quarterly leaders' gathering, but we need to get our coaching network back off the ground. Our leaders are vital to the ministry, and if we truly believe this, we will be nurturing and investing in them.

Keep remembering and praying into Ephesians 3: 20-21:

Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen. FIRST PRES. PRESS

SESSION UPDATE

October meeting Our actually turned into two meetings as the discussion on the proposed 2014 budget was exten-We have been sive. concerned for the last several years that if the difference between our expenses and revenue increases, we will have to rely more on the Wagner Fund each year. Since this was not a trend we wished to see continue, serious time was spent not only in discussions at the meetings, but also in meetings with the committee leadership and staff members whose work is part of the budget. The final version of the budget proposed will be presented to the congregation in the stewardship mailing that will go out in early November.

Other business dealt with in the two meetings included:

-Action on a request for transfer of membership of Jason and DeeDee Camp.

-Approval of a request by the House Committee to do needed work on the Monroe Street house. -Acceptance of the report of the Nominating and Committee the scheduling of а congregational meeting on November 17. -Affirmed approval for a children's retreat to Rock Mountain Bible Camp the weekend of October 18 & 19. -Approval of an evening of training for parents as part of the Leadership Conference scheduled for February 7 and 8, 2014. -Action on Jeremy Finn's

-Action on Jeremy Finn's request to hold a Winter Weekend for youth on March 7 - 9, 2014 and approval of the concept of another Family Mission trip in 2014. -Reviewed and approved a revised Wedding Policy proposed by the Worship Committee.

Session members worked especially hard in October to ensure that they were being good stewards of the resources God has given to us and which you have entrusted to us. We ask for your prayers and support as we move ahead with our planning for 2014.

HOMEWORK CAFÉ UPDATE - Justin Park

In the October First Pres Press we outlined the objectives of the Homework Café program and briefly how volunteers would fit in. For November, we'll add the specifics that we have at the present time and once ask anyone again interested in participating as a volunteer to contact Justin Park (748-4192) or Barry Driggs (748-1770).

Homework Café began on Monday October 28 and is an after school program on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday at Jennie F. Snapp School from 2:30 to

4:00pm. The school is planning to divide the students selected for the program into three The first two groups. groups will focus on English and math for students who are at risk of doing poorly on the state tests to be given in the spring. Content of the material covered in these groups will most likely supplement what is done in the math or English classes. The third group will focus on homework assigned for the next class of any subject students are taking this year, so in addition to math and

English, science, social studies and languages (French, Spanish, and Italian) may be encountered. Students will be from grades 6, 7, and 8, and teachers will administer each session.

There is a possibility that there may be some opportunity to tutor some students in specific subjects during the school day. We'll pass along information on this possibility if it materializes.

Volunteers at UE are required to provide a form to the school with name, address, a bit of background information and two references who may be contacted. The church (FPC) requires that volunteers provide or have on file a sexual misconduct form. Both forms will be available in the office or from me.

If you like working with young people and want to help them through their education journey, consider volunteering. We will be as flexible as we can to accommodate your schedule and to use your background. Thanks for your consideration.

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STEWARDSHIP THE HABIT OF GIVING BACK TO GOD

A **STEWARD** is a person who is given responsibility for overseeing the possessions, affairs, servants, training of children, etc., of his/her owner or master.

In **Genesis 1:28**, God made human beings the stewards over creation.

In **1 Corinthians 4:1-4**, Paul said that the apostles were given responsibility for the gospel.

According to **1 Peter 4:10-11**, every Christian is a steward entrusted with a divine gift, and we have a responsibility to use those gifts well.

DID YOU KNOW ...

The Bible talks more about giving than it does about either heaven or hell.

Jesus talked more about giving than almost any other subject.

Over half of Jesus' parables have to do with money.

There are more promises in the Bible related to giving than any other subject.

WHAT DOES THE NEW TESTAMENT TEACH ABOUT GIVING?

"Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." 2 Corinthians 9:7

1. The Principle of Regularity (1 Corinthians 16:2)

Deeply embedded in the Old Testament idea of tithing and the New Testament teachings on giving is the principle of regularity. Regularity provides safeguards around giving:

a. **Regularity takes giving out of the realm of emotions or mood- giving.** Giving often begins as a simple act of obedience; the joy in giving comes as our faith matures.

b. **Regularity takes a lot of the pain out of giving**. There is often real grief in parting with money, but when we make a decision to give a particular amount or proportion, then it's just a matter of carrying out the decision regularly and systematically.

c. **Regularity saves us from self-deception**. If we give sporadically as our heartstrings are tugged, we can be deceived into thinking that we are very generous. But when you divide that into a year, it may only turn out to be a few dollars a week.

2. The Principle of Proportionality (2 Corinthians 8:1-5)

Also deeply embedded in Scripture is the principle of proportionality. We should give in proportion as we have received. Giving is not a transaction between you and the church treasurer. It is not a calcu-

lation of how much you owe to give your "share" of the church budget. Giving is a transaction between you and God, the one who gave it all to you in the first place. A spiritually mature way to determine your level of giving is to ask "What proportion can I return for God's work in order to signify and confess that all I am and all I have comes from God?" Some people with heavy obligations or little income will be challenged at a lower percentage than others. For many, however, a tithe (10%) is still no challenge at all, because it does not infringe on either their needs or desires. We have not necessarily "arrived" when we reach a tithe in our giving.

3. The Principle of Priority (Matthew 6:31-33)

A third biblical principle of giving is the principle of priority: set aside God's share first. It might seem like good stewardship to take care of all your necessities and then look around to see what is left for God, but the godly steward reverses the order. And that reorganizes your life!

4. The Principle of Risk (Mark 12:43-44)

Finally, the principle of risk. If we actually give God the first portion of our income, then we will begin to live adventurously. Most of us have a hard time seeing how we will live off 100% of our income. If we give 5% away, can we live on 95%? If we give away 15%, can we live on 85%? It becomes a thrilling adventure to live responsibly, while trusting also in God's care. Sometimes people will say that God promises if you give 10%, you will get that back, plus interest, every time. It may happen sometimes, but tithing (or risk-taking giving) isn't just a magic investment with 100% guarantee. You can trust that God will provide for your needs, but you may have to go without some of your desires or simplify your life. The blessings or rewards can be much deeper than a simple payout on your financial investment. After all, a gift that doesn't reorganize your life and make you step out in faith is no challenge at all to your spiritual maturity!

CONVICTING STATISTICS:

The median annual giving for an American Christian is actually \$200, just over half of one percent of after-tax income. (2009) During the Great Depression, Christians gave about 3.5% of their income. Today, Christians average less than 2.5% of their income. If committed American Christians (those who say their faith is very important to them and those who attend church at least twice a month) gave away 10% of their after-tax earnings, they could realistically increase their giving by somewhere between \$46 - \$85 billion to ministry around the world each year!
