Lent is one of the oldest seasons observed by the Christian Church. Irenaus of Lyons, a church father who lived roughly A.D.130-200, wrote about the Lenten observance in the early days of the church. Lent encompasses a 6-week period prior to Easter that is set apart as a time to intentionally focus on the spiritual disciplines of self-examination, confession, fasting and prayer. In the ancient church, Lent was also a time for new believers to receive instruction in preparation for their baptism at Easter.

FPC marks Lent in three ways as a faith community: the Ash Wednesday Agape Supper, a church-wide Lenten small group and worship focus, and special worship services during Holy Week. Read more about these opportunities in the newsletter. Although the practice of Lent is not required in Scripture, as Dallas Willard has said, if a certain spiritual discipline helps you grow in God's grace, then by all means do it!

# GOD IS ON A MISSION IN INDIA - JAN AND TIM DEVINE, CO-PASTORS

In 2005, when teams from FPC started participating in international mission trips, a Sunday morning was dedicated to sharing each experience with the congregation. Trips happen on such a regular basis now, that although each one is important, we can't use Sunday morning as the main venue to share. So, we would like to use our page(s) this month to give you a glimpse of some of the most encouraging aspects of the recent trip to India.

### THE CHILDREN AT NANDA

After 40 hours of travel, we arrived at the Nanda Orphanage/Hostel and were greeted by 140 children plus adults – all singing, dancing, showering us with flowers petals, and placing floral necklaces over our



heads. For the next 8 days, we watched and interacted with the most well-behaved, respectful, industrious and contented children we have ever seen. Although they have very few tangible possessions, they possess deep faith, biblical knowledge, and active prayer lives. Their creativity astonished us as they prepared dozens of skits and liturgical dances and presented them as gifts to us.

The staff can take much of the credit for the atmosphere of this place where children are safe, cared for, and valued. One little boy came to Nanda after the persecution. He was so traumatized that he would not speak; he would frequently hide high in a mango tree, refusing to come down. Today, this boy is smiling, talking, singing and playing right along with the rest of the children. Praise God for this place where children are flourishing!



# SAFE WATER

To our surprise and delight, the two wells at Nanda that are used for drinking, cooking and bathing tested safe. The third well is only used for irrigation. The water at the leper community was also good. We spent a week prayerfully discerning the most strategic places to install the two chlorinators purchased through the Christmas Eve offering. God opened the door for us to work with the science teacher at the Hindu, government-run, boys' high school where Saima used to teach. By providing clean water there, we were able to ensure that the chlorinator will be maintained, strengthen Christian-Hindu relationships, improve the health of 500 students, and begin to educate the community about safe water and hygiene. The second chlorinator will be placed in Saima's home village, which after being destroyed in 2009 during the persecution, is slowly rebuilding.

### DINING PAVILION AND KITCHEN

The children eat their meals squatting on the ground, with few options when it is hot or wet. Work started on a dining pavilion, using the welding equipment that was purchased last spring. The roof was finished before we left; a concrete floor and retaining walls will be added. The primitive kitchen (white building on left) will also be enlarged and improved.

### WORKING TOWARD SELF-SUFFICIENCY

The regular diet for the children is rice and dahl, a sauce made with lentils and spices. Since completion of a fence around the 7-acre compound and a new well for irrigation, Nanda has begun gardening. They now add tomatoes, carrots, mustard greens, peas, squash and other vegetables, plus bananas and mangos, to their diet. In the next year, more of the land will be cultivated. Plans are also being made to expand into animal husbandry, beginning with chickens. Extra vegetables, eggs and meat can be sold in the local market. The welding business will be

used to train older students and supply goods to the local community. (At Nanda, bunk beds were welded so that each child now has his/her own bed.) It was good to sit with the staff and envision together how agriculture, animals, welding, and sewing can be developed to teach the children trades and help move toward self-sufficiency. It will not happen overnight, but all were encouraged.

### **EDUCATION**

The staff is also committed to help the children succeed academically. An additional incentive will be a Scholar-ship Fund to help older children get a college education or vocational training. In order to "pay it forward," young adults who receive scholarships will give 10% of their salary back to the fund for the first 5 years of employment, so that other young adults may also benefit from higher education/training.

### WORSHIP

We had the privilege of worshiping each morning & evening with the children at Nanda, on Sunday with the Leper community, Monday with local church leaders who had been through the persecution, and Tuesday evening at the Baptist Women's District Convention. We were invited into a Christian home during a funeral, a Hindu home during a wedding, and into a Brahmin home for tea. It was a privilege for the team to be invited to pray at each place.



God is doing some amazing things in this little corner of His globe. We are humbled by God and by our brothers and sisters in Christ who live with courage and joy for the sake of the gospel.



Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever. Amen.

# WHAT DO YOU DO WHEN SOMETHING YOU HAVE BUILT BECOMES BROKEN BEYOND REPAIR?

This is precisely what God, the Creator, faced during the days of Noah. The narrative of Genesis describes how sin ruined His creation:

"The LORD saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth and that every intention of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually; Now the earth was corrupt in God's sight and the earth was filled with violence." - Genesis 6:5,11

Humans had become completely corrupt in both their thoughts and actions - MANKIND WAS BROKEN - A horrific tragedy considering that humans were to glorify God by submitting to His design for their lives - We praise the LORD by reflecting His image:

"God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created him, male and female He created them."

- Genesis 1:27





# CONNECTING THOUGHTS -SHARON EARLY

On February 8th, leaders from our children's ministry and small group ministry spent an extended morning in a shared leadership conference. They heard Tina Houser share the twists and turns her life has taken and her wrestling with what being 'All In' means to her. The small group leaders ended the day with a preview of the Lenten study "All In" by Mark Batterson. Needless to say, all of us wrestle with what it means to be "All In" and whether our lives reflect being "All In" for Christ or whether we have succumbed to being "All In" for something else entirely? This study can (and I am sure will) be overwhelming. Many of us may be reluctant to take the challenge, because in reality, we will never be "All In" this side of eternity. So why bother?





Him. We know we will constantly have challenges to our understanding of being "All In," but we do have a choice on how we handle our sinful nature. Do we sell our soul for "30 pieces of silver" as Judas did, and that is the end of the story, or do we choose to start again as Peter did after he betrayed Jesus? Both had been "All In" following their savior and both stumbled... After seeking forgiveness, Peter once again committed to becoming "All In."

That would be one of our goals in this study, to discern where we may be struggling to be "All In" and to take steps to take back that area of our life for Christ! All too often we can create idols in our routines, finding our security within the boundaries we establish in our lives, fearful of change. But behold, "if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone, the new has come!" (2 Corinthians 5:17) May we continue to let go of the old and welcome Christ's new creation in us on a day-to-day basis!

# SPOTLIGHT ON THE STAFF: SHARON EARLY - RICH KASTL

Sharon Early is our staff member for Connecting Ministries. Connecting Ministries are those ministries that connect people, make them feel like they belong, help them grow in faith, and give them the desire to serve within and beyond this congregation. in our lives—that is, God as an active, constant presence in our lives. The "All In" study will ask us to be "All In" when following Christ and to experience the kind of life God has created us to live.

# LOOK WHO'S IN THE HOUSE! - RONNE SISCO, DIRECTOR OF EDUCATION



# SESSION UPDATE -JANET FREDERICK, CLERK OF SESSION

Although it's only been six weeks since our last update, it has been a busy six weeks for church business.

At our January meeting, the majority of our time was spent in considering the budget for 2014, as well as the longer-term concerns regarding the financial future at First Pres. We committed to spending time at each of this year's meetings to address these concerns.

On January 26, we held the church's Annual Meeting. The Annual

Report was available to congregation advance of the meeting. by hard copy and digitally, and opportunity for comment was provided during the meeting. Following a review of the financial reports, the congregation approved the Terms of Call for the co-pastors and also approved a motion to use up to \$60,000 from the Wagner Fund in 2014 to cover Local and General Mission expenses, needed.

Our February monthly Session meeting was held on the 12th, and we heard about the mission trip to India, approved plans for some summer camp experiences for the children, and discussed how proceed with adto dressing some concerns about the stained glass windows in the sanctuary.

On February 22, the elders and staff members will be meeting together to examine and define our different roles and responsibilities and determine how we can move forward

together to deal with the challenges ahead of us.

We know that there are many challenges facing us in 2014. We are continually asking God to guide and direct our work and our and decisions. we covet your prayers and support as well. # NARRATIVE ON THE HEALTH OF MISSION AND MINISTRY -JANET FREDERICK

Session is in the process of using an evaluative tool that the Fellowship of Presbyterians has provided for PC(USA) and ECO churches and pastors called *The Narrative On The Health Of Mission And Ministry*. It is part of the way that we and several other church sessions will regularly participate in a peer-to-peer review to strengthen the mission and ministry of each participating congregation. Session has been sharing in each newsletter one narrative question that the elders have wrestled with, as we evaluate our purpose to reach more people and together grow in Christ. Below is Question #3:

How has the Holy Spirit been evident in your congregation in the past year; through conversions, growth in the fruits of the Spirit, or other transformational experiences that make disciples of Jesus Christ?

We know of children, youth and adults from or associated with our congregation who have committed their lives to Christ during the past year; we have started using the Faith Candle to celebrate these conversions.

The previously unreached Kutia Kondh tribe in India is hearing God's Word, and there have been conversions and baptisms recently as a result of the Grace and Peace Mission.

Through church-wide studies, such as *The Story*, we have seen evidence of growth in our spiritual journeys.

In both the Children's and Youth Ministries, an emphasis on the importance of families and spiritual development at home is challenging families in their roles in the spiritual growth of young people.

We have learned that we can speak of God's love through tragedies, such as unexpected deaths and floods.

In worship we are becoming more intentional about providing experiences that we can carry with us throughout the week and into our everyday lives.

# Critical Evaluation:

We are better at reflecting the good news through our actions than by speaking the good news, especially on a personal level. We need to become more comfortable speaking directly about the gospel with people and inviting them to respond.

We need to be more intentional about helping people to move from being nominal Christians to fully devoted disciples, from just attending to becoming invested members, inviting new people to join us in worship and other events, spending more time in corporate and personal prayer/fasting, and creating a desire to use our spiritual gifts for service.

Question 1 (12/13 FPP)- focused on the ways our congregation is seeking the welfare of the community to which we have been called. Question 2 (1/14 FPP)- focused on how we have/have not extended beyond our bounds through the establishment of new communities of worship and discipleship, expanding the Kingdom of God.
