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


BASICS - NATHAN JACOBS



By the time you read this, we will have met for the first time for BASICS. BASICS is a time that we are setting aside midweek to worship God in community and intimacy. The driving force behind beginning this new event is twofold: first, that we would gather together more frequently to worship corporately; and second, that we would be able to offer an intentional time of extended prayer, both individually and corporately. We want to use the tools that God has given us (Scripture, prayer, music, community) to glorify Him and to build each other up. Thursdays will be simple, without much structure, and will focus on just "the basics."

In 2014, more than 45 years after the universal handicap symbol was created, Gov. Andrew Cuomo signed into law a measure to make our state the first in the nation to replace this familiar visual with a new, more active and engaging symbol.

Sometimes it's helpful to take a fresh look at the symbols we use, to reexamine what something that has become so familiar to us really means. The cross is one of those symbols that has been taken for granted, misused, and misunderstood. It is found everywhere—from the top of a church steeple to the neck of a singer spewing violent or vulgar words. It is so pervasive that it can mean everything. . . or nothing at all.

It wasn't always so. Wearing a cross around your neck in the first century Roman world would have been like someone wearing a gold guillotine necklace in 19th century France or a diamond-encrusted electric chair today. It was a symbol of a terrible death reserved for the most dangerous criminals who deserved to die.

And then, early Christians began to use the cross as the primary symbol of their faith. Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 1:18, "For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." For those who do not understand, the cross is a symbol of all that is weak, irrelevant, useless. But what is considered weak and useless by many is a sign of what saves those who believe (1:21). The ancient symbol of death has become a symbol of life.

How do we restore the deep meaning of this symbol in a world where for so many it has become nothing more than a fashion accessory? It will only happen if the power of the cross is demonstrated through the witness of the people who follow the One who died on the cross. The power of the cross is not shown by what hangs around our neck, but by what shines through our life and conduct.

This past week, volunteers had to use the church snow blower to carve a path through the drifts and set up the Lenten crosses on the corner of McKinley and Monroe. Three large, lighted, wooden crosses stand there as a visible sign of hope- light in the midst of seasonal and spiritual darkness; new life in the midst of death. The cross is no longer a symbol of shame, but rather of our participation in the victory of Christ over all that separates us from God.

Romans 8:1 "Therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus."



CONNECTING THOUGHTS – SHARON EARLY

Since I am writing during the first week of our Lenten study, *Life on Mission*, I am not really able to talk yet about our Lenten groups. However, I do feel compelled to discuss why we put so much emphasis on being in small groups and on the process of discipleship, which is our focus in Week 5 (Grow) of the study.

Concerns have been expressed recently that FPC will become very judgmental as we continue to pursue becoming more defined by aligning with a set of core values that lifts Scripture up as the authoritative Word of God that teaches all that is necessary for faith and life.

In light of that concern, our challenge is this: how do we live and speak as Christ, who was full of both grace and truth (John 1:14), but did not compromise either? Knowing that all of us have sinned and fall short of the glory of God (Romans 3:23), how do we care for people and invite them to learn about and grow in Christ, while still upholding biblical values? That is where the beauty of small groups can come into play.



People come to faith when they recognize their own sinfulness, and at the same time see that God, and those who represent Him, love them no matter what their lives looks like. However, that is never the end of the story! The recognition that we need a Savior cannot be separated from the commitment to spend the rest of our lives learning how to submit to Jesus as Lord. Jesus doesn't call us to be one-decision converts; he calls us to be life-long disciples.

That life-long journey of discipleship is extremely difficult unless we are in a community of faith where people teach, challenge, nurture, and pray for each other. I would not be in ministry today if I did not have my Christian community surrounding me with prayer and walking with me as I decided "what's next?" when my job at IBM was eliminated. Leading up to this, God had been working on my heart through studies we had done with small groups, as I learned that everything I have (family, job, "stuff") is not mine, but God's. Could I give up my professional identity, trusting that my true identity is in Christ, and He had something greater in mind?

That is just one example. We have also walked alongside individuals and couples who are struggling with their marriage, parenting decisions, work that becomes too consuming, deaths, life not being "fair," and many other life struggles. Within a small group, one is not "judged" in a negative sense, but rather is exhorted and encouraged by others to live God's way. "Growing" side-by-side with other Christians is all part of living "Life on Mission."

Psalm 139:23-24 says, "Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting." I am learning to welcome that my small group helps me see where God is opening my eyes to offensive ways within me, so that I might become a better witness for God!

SESSION UPDATE -JANET FREDERICK, CLERK OF SESSION

Since our last update only took you through the end of 2014, this update will summarize what happened at several different meetings. The first was a regular Session meeting on January 14. Although the evening included breaking fast with the Presbytery Discernment Team, examining incoming officers, planning for the annual meeting, and adopting a budget for 2015, we also took care of some regular business. Action items included: 1) electing church officers for the coming year, 2) acting upon two requests to remove people from our membership roll who have not been active at FPC for quite a while: Dave and Mary Jenkins and Barbara and Karel Simeon, 3) approving a change in our internet provider, and 4) giving permission for a youth overnight retreat in March.

Our annual meeting of the church and corporation took place on January 25. We began the meeting by asking the congregation and ministry team leaders to share "wins" from 2014. It was good to listen to the many ways in which the congregation felt God working in and through our church. Session members then gave a presentation that addressed three of the most frequently asked questions we've heard about the discernment process (see the announcements in the bulletin and in this newsletter for ways you can get a recording or written resources from this meeting in case you missed it). The rest of the meeting dealt with the financial status of the church as of the end of 2014 and the challenges we face in 2015. Following the February Session meeting, the minutes of the Annual Congregational Meeting will be posted on the bulletin board.

On February 4, Session met again for our regular monthly meeting. As we ended our time of prayer/ fasting with a simple meal, each person had a chance to share where/how we sense God leading in the discernment process. Regular business included approving minutes of the January Session meeting and Annual Congregational Meeting, evaluating recent changes to the united worship service format and the events of the Annual Meeting Sunday, approving summer camp opportunities through Children's Ministry, and responding to invitations from Presbytery (open to all) to attend a pre-Presbytery information session and to pray/fast before the February 28 Assembly votes on amendments from G.A., a Dismissal Policy, and Sexual Misconduct Policy.

AN INVITATION TO PRAY AND FAST

Session members have committed to a 24-hour period of prayer and fasting prior to each monthly Session meeting during the discernment process. We invite all of you to also engage in an intentional time of prayer, Bible study, and fasting (from food or an activity) preceding the March 4 Session meeting.

DISCERNMENT PROCESS UPDATE

-JEN HUNT, RULING ELDER

Since last summer, we have all been actively discerning God's will for FPC and how we can best fulfill our mission "to reach more people and together grow in Christ." The question to be answered by FPC at the end of the discernment process is this: do we believe membership in the Presbyterian Church (USA) or ECO: A Covenant Order of Evangelical Presbyterians will best help us fulfill our calling from God? The elders have continued to set intentional periods of prayer and fasting and have encouraged the church to join us in this process.

During the congregational meeting in January, we celebrated the many ways that God has been at work within our church over the past year. We also reviewed the concerns that led us to begin this process, what will change or remain the same if we become members of ECO rather than the PC(USA), and how the rest of the process should unfold. There was an opportunity to respond to God's Word by expressing our prayers for the church, which were written and offered trusting that as we go through the discernment process together, God "is at work within us" and "able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine" (Ephesians 3:20). The following are prayers that were offered and represent the hopes of the congregation:

- I pray for clear direction; that God's will be done during this time of unrest in the church; that God's people would hear His voice and be willing to accept whatever it is that He says.
- I pray that we would be faithful to Christ as a witness here on the corner of Grant and Monroe.
- I pray that each person will experience the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and believe the truth of God's Living Word. In Jesus' name, Amen.
- Lord, bring my children to Jesus.
- Prayers that we at FPC continue to grow missionally within ourselves, in our neighborhood, and in the world around us.
- Dear Lord, help our church be unified in love for You and all of your people, and to keep You
 at the center. Help us to overcome our differences and make the best decision as a
 congregation to help us fulfill your will.

Lord, hear our prayers.
