Tim Keller, a well-known New York City pastor, opens up scripture in a way that is understandable and accessible. Books and the reading schedule are available at the church. ### PASTORS' PAGE - TIM AND JAN DEVINE, CO-PASTORS

One of the surprises for me as I (Tim) recover from my total knee replacement is the inability to sleep. The doctor said it would be about 6 weeks before I would return to my normal sleep pattern. Wow, he was right.

In the sleepless moments, I do laps around the first floor with my walker throughout the night. I have gained a new appreciation for noticing, looking, and hearing what is going on outside. I also have realized that night is a time to open not only my eyes, but also my spirit, so that I can be aware of how God is moving and guiding me through my life. I have been reading the psalms during this time of physical and spiritual alertness.

We are in the season of Advent, a time in the life of the church that is set apart for spiritual preparations and reparations. It is in this spirit of preparation and reparation that Jesus admonished his listeners to watch and be ready for the unexpected and unpredictable return of the Messiah.

In Matthew 24:36-44, Jesus calls us to attention with his urgent message: "Stay awake!" so that we will be ready to respond to the needs around us. "Stay alert!" so that we can notice God at work in our midst. Advent is a time for our spirits to wake up so that we can be aware of God's presence in our lives.

Jesus is not really telling us to never shut our eyes, but rather, to avoid closing down our spirits. It is easy to move through the day as though in a dream. We interact with screens from morning to night, while avoiding interaction with other human beings, not to mention the Holy One. We can be plugged into one device or another, fill our eyes and minds with news and images, and never leave room for a whisper of the Spirit or a nudge from a guiding and loving God. We can be lulled into complacency by watching endless loops of music videos or reruns of our favorite TV shows. We immerse ourselves in an ocean of blogs that invite us to click from one link to another. Minutes and even hours can go by before we realize that this was not the best use of our time. Wake up!

Jesus commanded us to be watchful and to expect the unexpected. He talked about a God who will surprise us by coming when we're not looking or arriving in a way that we do not expect. This powerful Advent passage reminds us to be aware that the God who came into the world as a baby so many years ago still wishes to enter our lives today. Too often, our minds are so full, our calendars are so packed, and our expectations are so low, that we don't actively look for the living Christ in our midst.

- Wake up! -- God is at work all around you.
- Wake up! -- Don't miss the blessings that are right here.
- Wake up! See the ways we can share the good news and the good deeds of Jesus Christ with our community in the new year.

Jesus Christ has come into our world. He has promised to come again. And in this in-between time, Jesus cries, "Church, wake up! See the world as I do. Love the world as I do. Serve the world as I do."

### DECEMBER 2016 SESSION UPDATE - LINDA WILLETS, CLERK OF SESSION

But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see – I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people." - Luke 2:10

Let us use the season of Advent to welcome Jesus and be changed by Him.

#### SESSION EDUCATION/TRAINING:

As part of our ECO study of the *Book of Confessions*, elders focused on the *Heidelberg Catechism* at our November meeting. Elders appreciated the question-answer format to study the biblical truths found in the Ten Commandments, the Apostles' Creed, and the Lord's Prayer.

#### FPC:E MISSION/EVANGELISM:

- Session spent time praying for the Men's Mission Trip to Honesdale, PA (November 3-5); Serve Day (November 13); the 48-hour prayer vigil and Stewardship Dedication (November 11-13); the Praise and Worship Service shared with First Baptist Church (November 19); where God will lead FPC:E beyond the Evangelism weekend, Nehemiah series, and "To Transform a City" study; and for particular people and needs within the congregation.
- Discussed possibilities for the church-wide Lenten study, which may include "doing" as well as "studying."
- FPC:E Kenya Mission Trip June 25/26 through July 8, 2017. Interested? Talk to J/T Devine or P/A Davis.

#### **SESSION WORK:**

- Approved funds from the Conference Support Fund to help offset costs for at least 8 participants to attend the National ECO Gathering in Greenville, SC on January 24-26, 2017.
- December 7 will be the annual joint Elder-Deacon-Program Staff Meeting.
- Approved using 2017 Capital Improvement Fund to purchase a new control panel for the sanctuary lights and to share with the Nursery School the cost of purchasing a copier to replace the Canon copier.
- Approved the remaining 2016 ECO-related Mission Funds as follows:
  - \$3,000 to church planting initiatives in our Presbytery of the Northeast
  - \$2,000 to Presbyterian Frontier Fellowship
  - \$2,000 to Antioch Partners
  - \$1,600 to The Outreach Foundation
  - \$524 to water projects Doug Kerr and team will install in Kenya in January.
- Approved allocation of the remaining 2016 Disaster Relief Funds: \$3,000.75 to WorldRenew for National Disaster Relief and \$2,000 to WorldRenew for International Disaster Relief.
- Approved re-designating \$1,000 of national funds to WorldRenew for national disaster relief.
- Approved the initial recommendations of M & S Committee for 2017 mission designations.

#### FPC:E NEWS AND PLANS:.

- Elders heard about the October 7-8 Presbytery Meeting. Jan and Tim Devine will become
  co-moderators in January 2017. They hope the non-preaching pastor can visit and support
  churches in our Presbytery on different Sundays during the upcoming year.
- The Mother/Daughter weekend at Rock Mountain Bible Camp was a great success.
- Simple plans were made to celebrate the 110th anniversary of FPC:E on November 6.

### CONNECTING THOUGHTS -SHARON EARLY

Driving by Toledo on our way to Michigan, I was reminded of the first mission trip we took with the church youth group. It was in a neighborhood with stately, old homes, and although you could tell the area had declined, it didn't appear all that terrible. That is, until we came back out to the parking lot to discover that within the first 30 minutes there, our car had been broken into. I guess that really made it click why the church had a security guard walking the building, locked doors and a security system, and why the church was using endowments to survive. That was 17 years ago in Toledo: today we are facing many of the same dynamics in our community and within our own church.

It has been very timely to do the sermon series on Nehemiah and the small group study, "To

Transform a City," this fall. It has opened my eyes to a community around us that doesn't anticipate a new Kingdom and doesn't even know that they can hope for more than what is.

Advent is a time when we remember the birth of the true King and anticipate his return. We love the Bible



stories of people who anxiously awaited the birth of the King and were ready to worship Him at his birth. We, on the other hand, just spent more than a year swallowed up by a political process and election that has polarized our country— all because we are looking for a human president to save us.

What is the role of the church in the world, and how can we bring healing and hope for something better? In our study, we learned that "Kingdom" is mentioned 121 times in the gospels, yet "church" is only referenced three times. What is the difference between "church-work" and "Kingdom-work"? I resonated with this quote: Jesus builds the church and the church helps build the Kingdom, the embodiment of what life looks like when living under the reign of God—an attractive and compelling alternative to "what is." How can we share with those around us that there is a compelling alternative to "what is"? There is growing consensus among those in small groups:

- Can we go one step deeper in each of our existing ministries to be more intentional about bringing the whole Gospel to our community? (Nursery School, Samaritan Supper, Climbing Ministry, Compassion Builders, Homework Café, Summer Tennis Program, etc.)
- Can we partner with existing organizations to help transform our city? We do not think that it is a coincidence that an exciting grassroots organization called "Endicott Proud" is rising up— please see additional information on the next page.

As we continue to discern our next steps, it will take everyone investing in Kingdom work to really help transform this community and give people a glimpse of a compelling alternative to "what is."

#### **OVERVIEW OF "ENDICOTT PROUD"**

This grassroots effort is made up of a diverse and growing team of people who share a vision to see the Endicott area renewed and revitalized. There are currently over 80 people involved, including Village of Endicott and Town of Union representatives, business owners, law enforcement officials, UE school administrators, and community members.



Their Vision: Make Endicott the choice destination to live, work, and play for young professionals, as well as enhance quality of life for current residents.

The group is subdivided into areas focused on safety, community appearance, culture, and new businesses as some first priorities. Our Serve Day on Nov. 13 showed quite a need for basic clean-up in the area, and we anticipate plugging into the community-wide clean-up this group will be organizing in the spring. We can also envision a revamping of our Compassion Builders to help in the surrounding neighborhoods. Both of those activities will be a few months out, but an **immediate upcoming need** is to show support of the group's vision when they host a news conference to roll out their plans. As soon as the December date is finalized, we will let you know the day, time, and location through the Weekend Update and Sunday bulletin. The more support we as a congregation and others in the community show, the more likely Endicott is to receive grant money and support for initiatives to tackle the work that needs to be done. We continue to be convicted that our church is planted on the corner of Grant and Monroe for a reason—and each of you were brought to this church for a reason. Whether you are called to do Kingdom work in your own immediate neighborhood where you live and work, or whether you will plug into Kingdom work in Endicott, God is doing some mighty things through FPC:Endicott!
