

Spring Sermon Series

Belief Requires Response.

For the seven weeks following Easter, we are focusing on portions of the Gospel of Luke that prepare us to respond in love and gratitude by serving our Risen Savior with our lips and our lives.

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We have just come through the season of Lent and Easter, where we paid particular attention to the last words Jesus spoke from the cross and the first words He spoke after rising from the dead. His words and actions changed the lives of many people who were there as He died. It is interesting how each person came to Jesus from a different place and in a different way.

Earlier in his ministry, Jesus had healed Mary Magdalene of seven demons. In response, she faithfully followed Jesus and stayed with Him even to his death (Luke 8:2).

Simon of Cyrene was walking into Jerusalem, just minding his own business, when he was forced to get involved. One moment he was a spectator, and the next moment he was coerced to carry the cross in that

terrible procession to Golgotha (Mark 15:21). Many believe that Simon came to faith, and his son, Rufus, is the same Rufus mentioned in Romans 16:13 as the one who was "chosen in the Lord."

The criminal, hanging on one side of Jesus, also hung onto every word Jesus spoke. In the last moments of his hopeless life, he asked Jesus for mercy and he received grace (Luke 23:39-43).

The Roman centurion was a seasoned executioner. He carried out his orders during the crucifixion with callous resolve. But as he watched the way Jesus died, his eyes were opened, his heart was softened, and he recognized that Jesus was truly the Son of God (Mark 15:39).

Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus were Jewish leaders and secret followers. They risked the anger of the Council by asking for the body of Jesus so that they could give him a proper Jewish burial (John 19:38-42). "What is true for all of us, however, is that being a Christian is not for spectators"

All of these people remind us that each of us comes to Christ from a different place and in a different way. What is true for all of us, however, is that being a Christian is not for spectators. Jesus calls usmen, women, and children- to join Him in actively taking the gospel to others by sharing the good news and bearing the burdens of others.

Sharing and Bearing. This is Jesus' call on our lives. This is our grateful response to Him. This is what it means to be committed followers of Jesus.

Cross-bearers live for Jesus by living for others. Let it be so here at FPC:E. Amen.

AMONG OUR PEOPLE

I've been thinking a lot lately about the faithfulness of God. It is amazing that we worship a God who is forever faithful to his promises to us; that no Word He speaks will ever come back void (Isaiah 55:11). God keeps his promises, even when we have been faithless in return (2 Timothy 2:13). This is evident to us in the act of the cross-that God would sacrifice so much in order to be faithful to his promises set out by the prophets, even as humanity continually rejected

We may not know when or how God will keep his promises to us, but we can be confident in the truth that He will keep them - I would encourage you to read the story of Joseph (Genesis 37 -50) and how the promise made to him was fulfilled many years after his death (Joshua 24:32). I will leave you with lyrics to the bridge of a song I can't get out of my head, *Yes and Amen*, by Housefires:

is your faithfulness
All your promises are
Yes and Amen
(Ref. 2 Cor. 1:20)

During Lent we studied the Last Words Jesus spoke from the Cross.

SO NOW WHAT?

Will the time we spent studying God's Word bring only a little bit more head knowledge, a fond memory of worshiping together Easter morning, and a thought in the back of our heads that we should be different? Or will we refuse to let the busyness of life crowd what we learned out of our consciousness, so there might be a lasting impact on our lives?

During our Lenten study, we were asked to name our greatest spiritual thirst right now. Mine was a deeper prayer life. Rather than allow it to remain an unfulfilled desire, I used Holy Week and the prayer room in the chapel to act on this desire. Each day became a different experience as I prayed through Scripture in solitude, prayed with a sister in Christ for each member of our small group, prayed through life lived and connecting with spiritually thirsty people, prayed intentionally with someone in need, and prayed once again through each word spoken from the cross on Good Friday. All I can say is **WOW!** When I gave God room to show up in my life, He did- **Big Time!**

Jesus told a parable in Luke 16:10 that ends with: "whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much." I read a devotion based on this parable that went in a different direction than I have heard in the past. Rather than focus on our material wealth, the devotion used the parable to think about our faith and trust in God. When we are faithful with a "little" faith, we will be led to situations that require even greater faith (trust) in God. Jesus spoke with a rich young man who struggled with trust (Matthew 19:21-22). When he was told to sell his possessions and follow Christ, he went away sorrowful because he wasn't willing to place his trust in Christ instead of his wealth. I was challenged during Holy Week to trust God to give up some of my time in a busy week to focus on prayer, and it was amazing how God showed up!

Following Easter, small groups and our Sunday messages will focus on a new series, *Bearing the Cross*. We all have choices to make each day. I know I need to ask myself if I am willing to trust a little more each day and willing to bear whatever cross I have been given for Christ? This can be difficult if we are walking alone. So I am going to challenge myself – even as spring commences with additional pulls on my time- to trust that setting aside time to meet with a group of fellow believers will result in a greater intimacy with Christ that is worth far more than any possession or time I may have. Will you take the challenge with me?




To our FPC:Endicott ladies,

SPIRITUAL GIFTS & THE BODY OF CHRIST

Many people are familiar with the "love passage" in the Bible, I Corinthians 13: "If I speak in the tongues of men and of angels, but have not love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal...love is patient, love is kind...faith, hope, and love abide, but the greatest of these is love." But do you know what the preceding chapter is about? (Go ahead, look it up). That's right, I Corinthians 12 is about spiritual gifts. When we exercise the spiritual gifts that God gives to each and every believer, we help to fulfill the "embodiment" of love that will endure long after spiritual gifts are gone.

Ephesians 4:16 sums it up this way: "From Christ the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work."

So what's all this talk about the body? You may have heard of the idea that together believers in Jesus form the "body of Christ." I Corinthians 12 explains this idea along with describing spiritual gifts. This chapter of Scripture tells us 3 things about this "body" and spiritual gifts.

- 1) Each "body part" (believer exercising his or her gifts) has a unique role.
- 2) All "body parts" are needed. The body is incomplete without all its parts.
- 3) "Weaker" parts are to receive more honor than seemingly more important or visible parts. All the body parts are to work together to support each other.

What about you? Do you know what "body part" you are, what your unique role is in the body? Are you functioning in the body as you are designed, working together with all the other parts to build each other up in love? If you are unsure about the answers to these questions, you can ask the Holy Spirit to show you what gifts He has given you and where they are meant to be used.

ean Jenkins and Sharon Early were appointed as our congregation's commissioners to the May 5-6 Presbytery meeting at Liberty Corner Presbyterian Church in New Jersey. This will be the final meeting of the Presbytery of the Northeast, because on July 1, we will officially multiply into three smaller presbyteries. FPC:E will be a member of Cornerstone Presbytery which generally includes upstate NY and the northern part of PA.

House Committee is helping the Nursery School complete the exciting addition of a Sensory Room.

The retaining wall in the backyard of the manse is being replaced after it collapsed.

SESSION TRAINING
