# A Note from the Pastors

#### A Time to Mourn and a Time to Give Thanks

This is the month when we set aside a day at the beginning of the month to remember those who have gone before us, and a day at the end of the month to give thanks to God. For some, especially those who are feeling the raw pain of loss and grief right now, these two days do not belong close to each other. But the writer of the book of Hebrews reminds us that there are two things about death that give us courage and direction for life.

The first is the "cloud of witnesses" that surrounds us. Who is the writer talking about when he describes this cloud of witnesses? The opening word "therefore" gives us a clue that we need to look before "therefore" in order to understand what come after. The preceding chapter (11) names people who have demonstrated great faith, courage, and obedience. By their godly examples, the saints who have gone before us pave the way for us. They bear witness to the life of faith we now live. For the ancients who have gone before us, and for our loved ones who have gone before us, we give thanks that they show us the way.

Worship with us on All Saints Sunday, November 5, as we remember and give God thanks for those who have gone before us. Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

Hebrews 12:1-2

Even more, we give thanks for Jesus, who counted it joy to endure death on a cross for our sake. He is the pioneer and perfecter of our faith. In 2 Corinthians 9, Paul reminded the early Christians that when we receive the gift of grace from God, we become eager to share our gifts with others in grateful response. Paul ends the chapter by exclaiming, "Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift!"

Worship with us on Thanksgiving Sunday, November 19, as we remember and give God thanks for all his good gifts, especially the "indescribable gift" of Jesus Christ.



# CONNECT

As we have been studying the Beatitudes, I really have resonated with the Amplified translation of them. Each one gives a different perspective on what that individual blessing actually is:

Blessed [spiritually prosperous, happy, to be admired] . . .

Blessed [forgiven, refreshed by God's grace] . . .

Blessed [inwardly peaceful, spiritually secure, worthy of respect] . . .

Blessed [joyful, nourished by God's goodness] . . .

Blessed [content, sheltered by God's promises] . . .

Blessed [anticipating God's presence, spiritually mature] . . .

Blessed [spiritually calm with life-joy in God's favor] . . .

Blessed [comforted by inner peace and God's love] . . .

Blessed [morally courageous and spiritually alive with life-joy in God's goodness] . . .

There are so many different ways of being blessed that we may not always think of as a blessing. But in reality, who wouldn't want to be spiritually alive with life and have an inner peace and joy? I am truly thankful for this community of faith, which continues to nurture my spiritual walk and has enabled me to experience many of the above blessings! Having an expectation that we are not passive, but active, in the disciplines of our faith has kept me from drifting to becoming a complacent Christian. We have to actively choose to change habits when we see our behaviors are not giving the desired result.

This summer I experienced this first hand with my health. I would let schedules and almost anything derail my desire to exercise (well....maybe it wasn't a true desire, but an understanding that I needed to exercise!). We rescued a Siberian husky knowing it would require a lot of exercise. Every day now I have to intentionally find time to take him out for a 4-mile walk (with some significant hills) or he is relentless about not letting me get anything else done around the house.

As a disciple, I need to continually be asking myself how to be as intentional with changing a Spiritual Habit as I was with my health. Recently, Session and now the entire congregation, has been encouraged to create a plan to flourish as a disciple. Like my experience with my exercise, I have to understand what is lacking in my life, evaluate what I need to change, and be willing to let someone hold me accountable to following through. I am thankful and definitely feel blessed that our church continues to encourage me to walk the talk by being part of a small group and encouraging me to find my "Siberian husky" accountability partner to help me be as persistent in my spiritual walk as I am with my health. 

Stewardship Sunday is November 19, 2017.

For others, it is an opportunity to practice obedience in one of the spiritual disciplines that help us grow as flourishing disciples.

And for some, it is a joyful opportunity to set aside a portion of the blessings they have received from God and commit it toward the building of his Kingdom.
