A Note from the Pastors



The Power of Investment

"My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit, and so prove to be My disciples."
(John 15:8)

Jan's father was an electrical engineer who spent his whole life working at General Electric. He believed in GE, its products and its work. GE did good work and had a big influence on people's lives. Jan's dad invested in GE stock, and he gave some shares to his five children. From time to time we would ask him if we ought to diversify. His careful answer was, "GE is already very diversified. If GE stock tanks, it will be because the whole economy has crashed." For a long time, his evaluation was right. For over a century, GE was an original member of the elite Dow Jones Industrial Average. Fifteen years ago it was the world's most valuable public company. For decades it performed well and bore good fruit for those who invested in GE stock.

And then GE fell on hard times. Some of their divisions did not perform as expected, the demand for other businesses fell, profits were weak, and the value of GE stock plummeted. This summer, GE lost its coveted spot on the Dow. Company officials and investors alike realize that dramatic changes are needed if GE is to regain its health and profitability.

The analogy isn't perfect, but maybe we ought to look at the American church in terms of an investment as well. We believe in the Church, its work, and the God for whom we work. For years, the Church has done good work and had a big influence on people's lives. The Church, including FPC:E, had a plan that seemed to work: make the church the center of people's social life. Have good music, faithful preaching, a strong Sunday School, and an exciting youth ministry. Invest in those things, and you will raise up children, teens, and adults who become devoted Christ-followers.

In the last couple of decades, it has become clear that the American church is not performing as expected. The demand for our programs and activities has fallen; in spite of large investments, our profits (committed disciples) have been weak; and in the eyes of our culture, the value of the church has plummeted. We- the investors- are slowly realizing that something has to change if the church is to regain its health and positive influence on the world around us.

These changes are hard. They will involve loss before we will realize gain. They will cause us to grieve what used to be but no longer is. We will want to push back against changes that take away what is familiar and dear to us. Yet, it is important to remember the truth that early Christians knew- the church exists primarily for those who are not already Christ-followers, not chiefly to keep its members comfortable and happy.

So, how are we going to invest in new ways to get different results? How can we reach those who have no interest in coming to a church? How can we nurture an authentic faith within our children and teens that will become their own? How can we show our neighbors, co-workers, and classmates the heart of God? Together, let us continue to build on the investments of those who came before us so that we can invest in reaching a new generation of disciples.

DEVOTION

Ider Jean Jenkins led our opening devotion on prayer. She stated that "prayer needs to be the steering wheel of the church, not the spare tire,"

followed with the reading of John 14:13. She continued her devotion with "Jesus' Teaching on Prayer" which included the following readings:

Very truly I tell you, whoever believes in me will do the works I have been doing, and they will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father. And I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. You may ask me for anything in my name, and I will do it. (John 14:12-14)

Remain in me, as I also remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. (John 15:4-5, 7)

You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit – fruit that will last – and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you. (John 15:16)

ession approved the hosting of the May 18, 2019 Cornerstone Presbytery meeting at FPC:E.

 Session approved David Meza as the commissioner for the October 5-6 Presbytery Meeting at Cohoes PC, with

- Session approved the Chancel Choir and Music Ministry recommendation to donate unused choir robes to church we will help build in Kenya in February.
- Session approved Mission and Stewardship Committee's recommended allocation of undesignated SA causes funds for a total of \$11,000.
- Session approved the purchase of new ceiling tiles for the lounge and new dining room chairs. Also, they approved the purchase of new end tables and lamps for the lounge area. These purchases will be covered using funds from the renovation donations.

LIVES. - FROM IF: GATHERING

We have heard from some younger members of our congregation that they are looking to be mentored. This may go against what you expect from that generation since the media portrays them as self-centered and the "Me Generation." But when Christ gets ahold of you, there is a desire to be transformed into a new creation. This can be very difficult for most to go against society, your existing friends/family, and even your world view to become that new creation. This is why I believe one of the reasons God created a community of faithful followers is for us to come alongside others and be an encouragement when the going gets tough along that transformation process.

Last month I used the image of a caterpillar which in some ways can be that image of being self-centered (all it does all day is eat, eat, eat and is typically hidden from the world.) This month, I am using the image of the monarch butterfly. It has become transformed and now is a creation that is not hidden amongst the leaves but is free to fly about. It also has a mission to fly from where it emerged to a new mission field. That



transformation and mission is instinctual and an amazing example of our God's creativity. Unfortunately for humans, while we are given the incredible gift of the Holy Spirit when we become



Christians, many of us struggle to remain in tune to His leadings and promptings for our life's mission. For me, having others who have invested in me has helped me continue to listen to where He is leading me and has been invaluable for the direction my life has taken.

So my question this month is who are you investing in? Small Groups are one way to intentionally set aside time to connect and walk alongside others. Micro-groups can be an even more purposeful discipling experience with a set of common goals and intimacy that may not be found within a small group. One-on-one mentoring takes intentionality even further with a commitment by both to spend time working toward a common Spiritual goal. In numerous places in Scripture the mentoring relationship is encouraged to bring about life change that benefits the Kingdom:

"Likewise, tell the older women to be reverent in behavior, not to be slanderers or slaves to drink; they are to teach what is good, so that they may encourage the young women to love their husbands, to love their children, to be self-controlled, chaste, good managers of the household, kind, being submissive to their husbands, so that the word of God may not be discredited." — Titus 2:3-5

"Iron sharpens iron, So one man sharpens another." — Proverbs 27:17

"Train up a child in the way he should go, even when he is old he will not depart from it."
— Proverbs 22:6

All of us need mentorship along with being a mentor to someone else. My prayer for FPC:E is that we are serious about our discipling to such an extent we invest in a generation behind us and continually learn from a generation ahead of us!

TRY THIS

One way we can help to ensure a sticky faith in young people is to celebrate their faith journey and, as we do so, share our own faith story. Whether your kids are still little or are soon to leave the nest, why not try creating a Faith Journey journal or memory book with them. In it, record both those exciting moments and steps where their faith was impacted and blossomed as well as those moments where they asked big questions or faced struggles and the ways you worked through them.

As you do this together over the years, I pray there will be opportunity for you to share your own story. I'd also encourage you to list the people who poured into your kids and helped to shape their faith. Seek out intentional times for these people to share their stories with your kids. These honest stories of joys and challenges demonstrate how faith is alive; always changing, always growing. Furthermore, it gives young people a safe space to develop their faith, a sticky faith that lasts. When they have established that sticky faith, they can then, in time, pass that sticky faith along to another generation of believers.
