





THE PROBLEM OF SIN -JAN AND TIM DEVINE, CO-PASTORS

Many times our monthly page focuses on events or themes directly connected to this congregation, a particular season, or a moment in history. But every once in a while, we like to share some thoughts from others that challenge us, and hope that they will challenge you as well.

I, Jan, was recently sorting through magazines.
Often I do not get a chance to read through a weekly magazine before the next one (and the next one) is on our doorstep. So, it's hard to put them out for recycling because there are articles I would like to read . . . someday.

As I was sorting, I came across the April 2013 copy of *Christianity Today*. There were dated stories about the Newtown tragedy, initial thoughts about the new pope, and the vision of Saddleback Church (Rick Warren) to reach thousands of unreached people groups.



But what caught my eye were the words in the bottom right corner of the cover: "Did God plan the Fall?" pg. 38 I want the definitive answer to that timeless question!

Of course, I didn't get the definitive answer. The Bible explains *how* sin came into the world, but doesn't really explain *why* God allowed sin to come into a world that he made "very good." While very frustrating, these are things we can only understand in part for now, as Paul said in 1 Corinthians 13:9-12. So, acknowledging our limited ability to explain God's actions, the author challenged us to focus on our actions.

Throughout time, deep-thinking theologians have tried to understand sin and wrestle with our propensity to sin.

- † Reinhold Niebuhr was fond of saying that original sin- the conviction that every one of us is born a sinner and manifests that sinfulness in our lives- is the only Christian doctrine that can be empirically verified.
- † When wondering why the tree of the knowledge of good and evil with its forbidden fruit was placed right in the center of the garden of Eden, Dietrich Bonhoeffer concluded it is because that is where God belongs in our lives. The tree was not placed there as a trap, but as a way for humans to freely and fully choose to obey the God who invites us into relationship with Him.
- † Karl Barth described the world of Genesis 3 as an open door with a "do not enter" sign above it. Like Bonhoeffer, he concluded that it reflects God's desire that we humans freely orient ourselves to God and freely exercise the obedience that is our duty as creatures.
- † When G.K. Chesterton was asked what was wrong with the world, he avoided all the expected answers which blame sin on others or circumstances or history. What's wrong with the world? Tradition says that Chesterton responded with two words: "I am."

Where do your thoughts go as you think about the problem of sin? What about the Answer to sin?

- -The FPC Worship Team and Riverside Confession who provided worship music to keep us focused on Who is always at the center of why we reach out to others—an Awesome God!!


SPOTLIGHT ON THE STAFF

It is a pleasure to welcome Megan Nuffer as she begins work in the nursery. Megan is a nursing student at Binghamton University and has much experi-


ence taking care of children. Parents and children alike will be drawn to her warm and friendly personality.

Our meeting began on September 4 with a presentation by Sharon Early, Nathan Jacobs and Elder Jen Hunt, who made a presentation on behalf of the newlyformed Communications Committee. Their hope is that this committee will the various oversee forms of communication being utilized now and those being proposed for the future. Session voted to authorize the committee to expand the use of our Facebook page and to authorize these three individuals to administer all forms of our digital media. Policies regarding the use of these forms are being drafted. For our training in the coming months, Session has committed to a selfevaluation of FPC using the Narrative Questions once used by PC(USA)

and currently being used by PC(USA) churches in The Fellowship of Presbyterians. At this meeting ourselves we asked how the Holy Spirit has been evident in our congregation during this past The responses year. were encouraging, but we all admitted that we need to be more intentional as the Holy Spirit works through us, and discussed ways that we can be challenging ourselves to do this.

For action, the pastors requested permission to participate in a mission trip to India, tentatively scheduled for January 27 to February 7. We also approved their participation in a future Dominican Republic mission trip in order to become familiar with this FPC mission initiative.

Many of the items for information came from the administrative areas of church life:

Finance – As usual, to cover expenses over the summer, Treasurer Art Davis has had to borrow \$26,000 from the Wagner Fund. It is hoped that giving will return to normal levels this fall. Requests for the 2014 budget are due by mid-September.

House - Although we did hear of the completion of one major project (the replacement of the roof on the Monroe House), there are many issues that need to be addressed in the coming months, i.e. technology issues and several projects related to properties other than the church building



itself.

Personnel - The pastors reported that the transition in the front office has gone well, as has the transition in leadership of the Nursery School. Ronne Sisco is now the full-time Director of Education and Derek Washburn is the part-time Director of Business.

The Deacons would like to thank all those who generously donated school supplies for the Charles F. Johnson School. We were able to take over 8 full boxes of supplies to be distributed to those who had none. Your support of needy students makes a bigger difference in their educa-

HOMEWORK CAFÉ RETURNS TO JFS

In the 2012-13 school vear the Homework Café after school program at Jennie F. Snapp School was not included in the budget. For the 2013-14 school year funding has been restored, and the will program begin around the end of the first marking period in late October or early November. The program offers 6th. 7th and 8th grade students who need some extra help the opportunity to stay after school for an hour and a half on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday to work on homework with assistance from teachers and volunteers. The students are identified for help by teachers, parents, or themselves to help improve their performance through better understanding of sub-

jects causing them problems and through a structured study environment.

First Presbyterian Church has supported the program for over a decade with volunteers who can provide an hour and a half one, two or three days a week with exceptions as necessary. We try to provide some subject matter expertise and, more importantly, help the students to stay focused and to use the resources available (text books, library dictionaries. material. etc.) to get the assigned work done. We find that the subject matter can be challenging at times, and at times we will need the teachers' help.

At this point we would ask any of you who may be interested in working with this age group to give me, Justin Park (748-4192), or Barry Driggs (748-1770) a call to let us know of your interest and to let us know which days would be best for you. We try to have two to three volunteers available each day and we know that we need to plan for covering some days when another priority comes up for a volunteer. We will do our best

to get organized in October and will provide more information in the November FPP and church bulletin. Thanks for your consideration.

Don't neglect good dental hygiene/care because you don't have dental insurance. There is a way for you and your children to receive dental care for a minimal cost, and at the same time, help students get the clinical experience they need.

Students in the Broome Community College Dental Hygiene program clean teeth, polish amalgam, place sealants, take Xrays, make sports mouth guards, and provide a wide variety of other services under the careful supervision of their professors. Children adults over 65 are charged \$20; patients between the ages of 13 - 64 years old are charged \$30. Appointments last

3 - 4 hours because the setting is a learning institution. If additional work is needed beyond routine services, a second appointment may be necessary. Call 607-778-5015 to make an appointment.

One of the participants, Rita Hooper, from Fulton, NY will be our speaker.



GO AHEAD AND LAUGH...THEN THINK ABOUT IT







Fasting. If I'm being honest, I'm terrible at it. When I fast (which is rare, by the way) I choose one of two strategies:

1.) Fast from something I already don't do.

For instance, broccoli. If it's time to fast, I might fast from broccoli. Never mind the fact that I don't like broccoli and it's not something we typically have in our house; if I'm fasting I will make sure that no broccoli of any kind will touch my lips. I realize that I'm not stepping out of my comfort zone or giving up something that I have an emotional connection to; it's time to focus on God and I don't want broccoli to be "one more thing" that causes me to lose that focus.

2.) Fast from something I enjoy, but add a lot of "red tape" to it.

In this instance, I might fast from sweets. But, like JP, I'd add a ton of stipulations to the fast. Such as coffee. I drink coffee every morning, and I need to have at least one cup or else I'll have a headache all day. I rarely drink my coffee black; I prefer to load it up with sugar and cream. I mean, I have to have my coffee, right? And in order to make sure I drink it all, I need to sweeten it up. Otherwise I'll have a headache. This is a matter of my physical health and well-being, and certainly God would understand that my "fasting of sweets" does not apply to my morning cup.

Obviously, neither of the above strategies is the right way to go about things. Real fasting is hard, though.
